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Health Literacy

"The degree to which an individual has the capacity to obtain, communicate, process, and understand basic health information and services to make appropriate health decisions" ¹

Effects of poor health literacy

Unnecessary hospitalization ²

Less preventive care ³

Low self-efficacy ⁴

Self efficacy

assessment of one's ability to accomplish a task

Influences the decision to use a coping strategy

Influences how long one will persist when a task is especially difficult ⁵


Shame


67.2% hid their difficulty with reading from their spouse ⁸

Current Solutions

Universal Precautions Toolkit 10

- Assume **all patients** may have limited health literacy
 - Use strategies like the teach back method

Plain language guidelines 11

- Choose short, easy-to-understand words

However

Primary care practices struggle to implement Toolkit measures ¹²

- Red tape, time constraints, lack of support

"Plain English" is subjective 13

- Cultural differences and language barriers

Current Solutions

Patient education programs

- Diabetes education improved disease management ¹⁴
- ⁻ Time commitment
- Not feasible on a large scale

Patients need solutions that can be **used** at home

Current Solutions

Online Communities

- Can be accessed at home
- May be especially helpful for patients with rare diseases
- Study on PatientsLikeMe found ALS patients got advice on best options for respiratory therapy, as well as how to adapt their chosen option for better mobility ¹⁵

However

Must **split attention** away from online reading to visit online community

Finding relevant forums is challenging

Lower literacy readers may **give up** looking for information earlier than high literacy readers ¹⁶

Ideal Solution?

- Available for home use
- Flexible and can adapt to patients' information seeking needs
- Scalable
- Does not require navigation to other sources, but is not obtrusive

Proposed Solution

Creates an interactive layer over webpage content




Facilitates an online learning environment

"Got it"

Benefits of a browser plug-in

- No special app
- No extra navigation required
- Users simply search for information online as normal










Question Placement


Does integrating questions into content improve learning?

- Some evidence it improves reading comprehension, perhaps by reducing cognitive load ¹⁷



Autism Spectrum Disorder

Overview

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a developmental disorder that affects communication and behavior.

Focus Assistance

Beneficial for anyone reading challenging material

May be especially important for low literacy users

 Low literacy readers lost their focus when reading dense material, while high literacy readers did not ¹⁸

Feasibility Study

Participant: Five college students volunteered

Study Procedure:

- 1. Administered Form A of the Short Test of Functional Health Literacy in Adults (STOFHLA)
- 2. 5-question pre-test about Fuchs' Dystrophy.
- 3. Watch instructional video
- 4. Interact with webpage to complete tasks
- 5. Questionnaires: Demographic and feedback, as well as a post-test to judge comprehension of the health material.

Results

Results

Auto-generated questions:

Positive:

- "They help solidified my knowledge"
- Easy to use

Problems:

- Some questions did not make grammatical sense
- Some questions were too easy

Results

Medical word definitions:

Positive:

- Rated easiest feature to use

Problem:

- Definitions were too "high level"

Future work

Sophisticated natural language processing algorithm to auto-generate reasonable questions

Text summarization algorithms to simplify "high level" definitions from dictionary API

Use **target population** in a pilot study to investigate the effectiveness

Review

Patients and caregivers face barriers to improving health literacy within the healthcare environment

Many existing interventions are helpful but may not scale up

Take away

- Solutions to improve health literacy must operate outside the healthcare system to be effective in large populations

- "Got It" gives patients tools they can use to improve their health knowledge without requiring them to change how they search for health information online
